It's Showtime!

It's time to start getting ready for the Annual Show! Tom Colby will be kicking off the preparations with his talk on bonsai stands on August 9th at the general meeting.

Next, Lucy Judd will be presenting and giving a workshop where you can build your own accent plants on September 13th at our September general meeting.

Finally, there will be a bring-your-own-tree bonsai prep workshop on the third Sunday in September (Sept. 17th) at the Bonsai Garden. A flyer will be sent out as well as a newsletter article so you will know what to bring for your trees.

On the evening of October 6, we will be setting up the rooms for the show and all participants must bring their trees, stands and accent plants that evening. Details will follow in a separate advisement.

A GREAT way to be involved in the club and make friends is to volunteer at the show. It takes many people to make the show work! Right now we need to start filling in the task sheets with volunteers for the show. The show jobs include but are not limited to:

Docent and Security - we need individuals to be present and alert in the show room during both of the days of the show to ensure the trees are kept safe and not touched during show times. They may also act as docents for visitor's questions.

Hospitality - individuals are needed to prep food and beverages on both Saturday and Sunday. This includes coffee, tea and pasties in the morning, organizing food during the lunch periods and cleaning up and storing food before closing for the day. Sign-ups are for different time periods each day.

Plant sale - The plant sale area needs at least 2 individuals to manage the cashier's table and sale area in 2-hour increments for both days. It also includes security at the front door to ensure all plants and bonsai related items are paid for before leaving the building.

Reception table – This table must be manned at all times to greet visitors and direct them to the show and demo, etc. Sign-ups are for 2-hour increments and 2 individuals are preferred.

Demonstration and raffle - This is managed on Saturday only. Individuals sell raffle tickets at a separate table from the reception tale. The demo tree is stationed at that table until the demo begins. Once the demo begins, tickets are sold inside the demo room. At the end of the demonstration the raffle begins. Individuals run the raffle as well as sell the tickets.

So think about what jobs you'd like to volunteer for and be ready to signup at the meetings or picnic.

Bonsai Calendar



Watering

9am is the best time to water, but water 2 to 3 times daily to if needed to keep trees moist in the heat.

Place small trees in a tray of gravel to keep moist.

If you've defoliated trees, water less because of reduced transpiration.

Fertilizing

Do not fertilize Satsuki Azaleas or decandled pines.

Most other trees are ok to continue feeding.

Repotting

Not recommended at this time except for tropical and semi-tropical trees.

Styling/Pruning

You can work on almost any tree in August–as long as it's healthy. Make sure you meet this conditions before you wire and cut back:

- 1. Is it bushy?
- 2. Is it growing runners?

3. Has most of the foliage has hardened off?

Rotate trees. Watch for wire cutting during this period of fast growth.

Reduce pruning as higher temps and longer days slow growth.

Beware of heat build-up in pots insulate on sunny side to protect roots.

Julian Tsai on Japanese Maples

Julian's July presentation on *Japanese Maple Deciduous Development* covered the fundamentals of deciduous bonsai and penjing creation. In the first half of the presentation, he used slides and diagrams to make the point that you need to start your branch divisions close to the trunk (who is also far from your intended silhouette) so that you can get a dense deciduous tree.



Because of the exponential growth of twigging with each division, one additional layer of branches within your intended silhouette can be the difference between 5,000 and 10,000 branches. Julian made the point that cutting your tree to silhouette when you start the branch creation will never lead to the same density as building your tree from the inside out.

After the slide portion, he did a demo on this trident maple from Lone Pine Nursery. The tree had never been styled before so a hard reset on the branching was required. He cleaned up many dead stumps on the tree and applied cut



paste to start the healing process.

He also removed most branches, only leaving running shoots on the branches that he intends to thicken. The branches at the top were cut back more heavily than lower branches because the lower branches need to thicken more before development on the top branches can start taking place.

Larry Schmidt's Oak Bonsai

We have seen many fine oak trees as bonsai–and some of the most impressive trunk lines and spreading nebari are displayed on trees grown by Larry Schmidt. Larry was a longtime member of EBBS and passed away in 2020 from pancreatic cancer, so we cannot ask him how he achieved such amazing growth or what type of oaks they are - there are many varieties in his collection. But here's what we do know.

Larry served on the EBBS Board of Directors 1997-1999. I picked him up at his house and drove him to monthly meetings. He was always quiet and reserved, never drove a



car and usually got around by bus. I'm not sure how he got bonsai to club meetings, but he once brought scores of items to sell at the auction, including a bucket of

"muck". That led the Board to place a limit of ten items per seller.

He lived in a house in the Glenview district of Oakland with his long-time partner Carl Linkhart who is an artist and published writer. Larry developed an amazing garden in his backyard filled with wildflowers and some trees. Some of his bonsai were grown in containers on the front patio, which was also the roof top of his garage below. But the best trees were kept on the pitched roof of the two-story house.

One day, Larry phoned and said he'd like to show us his trees, so we went. After viewing the backyard and front patio, Larry led us around to the side of the house, climbed up on the side fence, and scaled the side of the house to the roof. With his long legs and wiry build, it was easy for Larry. I was more nimble then too.



There, we saw the Oak collection. Scores of trees, all with mature bark, gnarly branch structure, wide root bases, and

lush foliage. Most were growing in colanders or plastic wash tubs. The sun exposure and air flow on the roof were great! Larry explained that he climbed up daily to water his trees.

Larry told us that he grew them all from seeds that he sent away for from Europe. He had no problem getting them through Customs inspection by having them labelled as biological specimens. Larry worked a bit with Boon Manakitivipart when Boon was in Alameda. Also, Sam Adina came to help re-pot trees on Larry's roof top.

Larry left no records or documentation of the species or exact source of his trees, nor how he grew them with such wide bases. We can surmise that the colander containers allowed rapid root growth, and he probably watered them generously. I don't recall any discussion of soil or fertilizer. When we

began repotting the trees that we had acquired, the trees had fine root balls, no tap roots or large roots. The soil was similar to the bonsai mix we generally use,



but with more DG (decomposed granite), and was pretty compacted, suggesting a longer re-potting interval. There was no evidence of wiring or cut scars on any of the trees. Branch structure was very free-form and twisting, with not much ramification. Branches had been left to grow freely in all directions.

After Larry died, Carl contacted me about disposing of Larry's trees. Carl sold us four of what he described as Larry's best trees, that he wanted us to have. Then, Stephen Lysaght and Gary Anderson learned about the Schmidt collection and acquired them all. Fortunately, Steve and Gary have the space and muscle!

I displayed a bonsai from Larry's collection at the EBBS show in October 2022. At that time, it was labelled as an English Oak. My online search suggests it may be a Quercus cerrus, or lobata, or macrocarpa, or robur. I enjoy pruning and wiring the branches to suit my vision of this magnificent tree, and I may never be sure of its exact species.
