#### Here's Bob's bio:

I first became interested in bonsai in the mid-60s while in college and used the first Sunset book as my guide. I was drafted after college in 1968, and bonsai was forgotten for 17 years. In 1985 I saw a poster at a nursery advertising the Redwood Empire Bonsai Society in Santa Rosa. I joined and have been a member ever since. Mas Imazumi was the club sensei and my first teacher. Kathy Shaner followed Mas as the club sensei, and I took regular workshops with her. I have also taken workshops with Kathy's sensei, Mr Mitsuya. Mr Tokita and Mr Tanaka from Japan. In addition, I have taken workshops from Marco Invernizzi and Peter Tea. In 2010 I hooked up with Ryan Neil and have worked with him, mostly on my sierra junipers. Currently, I am part of a study group led by Adam Toth who has recently returned from Japan.

In 2012 one of my redwoods won "Finest North American Native Species Bonsai" award at the 3rd U.S. National Bonsai Exhibition in Rochester, N.Y. In 2015 another one of my redwoods was selected for the Artisans Cup exhibit in Portland, Or.

My son, Zack & I started Mendocino Coast Bonsai in 1997, and Zack left the business in 2018. I specialize in collected California natives, mostly redwoods. I also collect Mendocino pygmy cypress, shore pines, live oaks, and Sierra junipers. In addition to trees, I sell Sara Rayner and Vicki Chamberlain pots, burl slabs, stands, and tools.

Bob will have trees to sell before the meeting and during the break, so bring your checkbook if you think you might want one of these cool trees! His website is <u>mcbonsai.com</u>.

## Bonsai Calendar

## To enjoy fall color, gradually move maples and other shaded trees into the sun.

- Review exposure of trees to the movement of the sun.
- Rotate trees twice a month.
- Conifers and Broad Leaf Evergreens can be cut and wired.
- Deciduous can be cut and defoliated. Wiring them this time of year is OK, but be sure to watch for wire bitting into branches when new growth starts in the Spring.
- Remove wisteria from the pan of water after foliage has yellowed.
- Insect and disease control Remove dead plant material. Watch for and treat insect infestations.
- Last opportunity to sever airlayers having adequate rootage.
- Good time to collect conifers from the High Sierras with permits to do so.

Bob Gould - Many members of our club know Bob for his expertise in azaleas, but he stretched his wings and showed this exceptional specimen of a juniper from his collection!



**Antonio Saraceno:** Antonio's 30-year-old fig tree is a testament to the power of persistent care. For all these years, it has never produced a fig, thanks to Antonio's diligent pruning every three weeks. Initially rooted in his neighbor's yard, the tree was lovingly passed on to him a quarter-century ago, and since then, it has thrived under his watchful eye.







Julie Holcomb: Julie's Persian ironwood tree tells a poetic tale. Leaning gently to its side, its posture is reminiscent of a tree caressed by the ripples of a river. Julie's evocative Tokonoma display, dubbed "Water Dragon," tied this imagery together with a graceful Japanese scroll. In Japanese culture, the dragon is a symbol of spirit, and Julie's tree truly embodies this ethereal essence. **Lou Cortez:** A newcomer to the EBBS, Lou brought a unique and fascinating addition to the exhibit. His Kelly's Prostate Bonsai, a type of mutant Redwood, is an unexpected marvel. This botanical oddity does not reach for the skies like its towering relatives; instead, it sprawls like a ground cover, a testament to nature's whims.

**Randall Lee:** Randall's Lebanese cedar tree is a story of survival. Once part of a trio of trees he got from his mother, it has faced adversity, with one of its siblings succumbing to nature and the other toppling over. The cedar stands as a resilient sentinel, bearing the memories of its fallen companions–and mom.



**Bev Martinez:** Bev's manzanita bonsai defies the norm. While many consider manzanitas challenging to tame into bonsai form, Bev's tree stands as a beacon of health and beauty, a symbol of her skill and dedication to the art.





**Tom Colby:** Tom's Suzuki azalea was intricately styled. No surprise that the craftsmanship Tom brings to his bonsai is top notch!



Alise Lacosse-Offeman: Remember that demo juniper Jason was working on? Alise was the raffle winner! Alise's juniper is deeply intertwined with the history of EBBS. It was originally a raffle tree that was used in a demo by former Bonsai Garden curator, Kathy Shanor. it has seen highs and lows, including a bout with blight. Now, rejuvenated and reshaped by Jason, it has found a new guardian in Alise, promising a bright future.

**Michael Cullen:** Michael's ginkgo forest planting stands as a testament to patience and innovation. Grown from mere seeds, this tree has never been cut back! Michael's unique method of using a styrofoam cooler filled with ice to simulate winter for the tree is both ingenious and a tribute to his dedication to understanding the intricate needs of his trees.

Janet Nelson: Janet's crepe myrtle bonsai is a story of resilience and rebirth. Its gnarled trunk might have led many to believe it was beyond saving, but under Janet's care, it defied all odds. Bursting with life and adorned with flowers, this tree is a living testament to the power of hope and perseverance.





**Jeff Behring:** Jeff's Japanese black pine is not just any tree; it stands as a majestic representative from his impressive collection of pines. Its magnificent trunk speaks of age, grace, and the meticulous care that Jeff has devoted to it over the years.

**Rick Trumm:** Not to be outdone by his better half (that being Janet!), Rick's juniper carries with it centuries of history. Extracted from a heavy snow drift in the Sierras two decades ago, this tree, estimated to be around 250 years old, has withstood the test of time. Its first appearance, settled in an antique pot, is a harmonious fusion of age-old nature and human artistry.
